COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course introduces students to Applied Kinesiology (AK), a system of chiropractic analysis and adjustment developed by Dr. George Goodheart in 1964. This technique utilizes specific muscle testing procedures to assist in the location of interference to the nervous system and correction by using the "Five Factors of the Inter-Vertebral Foramen." Further study is made of the pelvic categories and cranial analysis and adjustment. The student is also introduced to the concepts of organ dysfunction analysis and correction.

- 02. List particular muscles associated with postural distortions
- 03. Compare muscle facilitation and inhibition
- 04. Explain the difference between appropriate and inappropriate muscular inhibition and facilitation
- 05. Explain how to correctly perform a muscle test.
- 06. Explain the concept of therapy localization
- 07 Explain the difference between an indicator muscle and an associated muscle
- 08. Identify the correct neurolymphatic (NL) point associated with a particular muscle
- 09. Identify the correct neurovascular (NV) reflex point associated with a particular muscle
- 10. Identify the correct acupuncture meridian muscle associations (AMC)
- 11. Describe how to perform AK cranial analysis and correction
- 12. Describe the differences between vertebral subluxation and vertebral fixation
- 13. Describe the respiratory assist procedure
- 14. Describe how nutrition is used in AK

Lab Objectives: At the completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- 01. Perform a postural analysis.
- 02. Identify specific muscles and their origins, insertions, actions, and nerve supply.
- 03. Perform standard AK muscle tests (including grouping of regional scans).
- 04. Analyze and correct inappropriate muscle inhibition using the "5 factors of the IVF." (includes use of therapy

localization and challenges).

- 05. Analyze and correct spinal fixation complexes.
- 06. Analyze and correct the basic cranial and sutural faults.
- 07. Analyze and correct the basic pelvic categories.
