Course Description

General Pathology supports the mission of Parker University College of Chiropractic by providing students with knowledge about the causes of disease and how disease develops so that the student will be able to discern methods that can be used in disease prevention and the promotion of wellness in their patients. The course will also include evidence based clinical research to introduce the student to clinical reasoning skills and knowledge of scientific literature.

General Pathology is at this point in the curriculum because the students have been exposed to normal anatomy and biological processes and so can appreciate the effects of malfunctions of these processes. Building on that information the student will be able to determine the manifestations in terms of symptoms and signs that will be produced in the patient and so will prepare the student for future courses in diagnosis. In this way General Pathology is the bridge between the basic sciences and clinical sciences and is the foundation for all future clinical practice.

General Approach to Teaching

My vision for teaching and my vision for the General Pathology course is to help the student become the best Doctor of Chiropractic that they can be and that your future patient's deserve. I see my responsibility as being not just to you, my student, but more to the patient's that you will treat in the future. To that end I will give you the information that experience has shown me is important to your future practice and to help you to see how the other courses in Basic Science have prepared you for Pathology and your future practice. The information in your notebook is not the sole material that you need to learn for this course and I expect that you will fill in the additional information by paying attention in class, taking notes and, if needed, reference the textbook.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the completion of this course the student should be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate knowledge of medical terminology
- 2. Explain the normal processes that are the foundational material for the topics in General Pathology
- 3. Describe how malfunction of the normal process produces pathology.
- 4. Analyze the etiological factors that are known to be involved in producing malfunction of the normal processes.
- 5. Infer the manifestations that a given disease or disease process will produce in the patient.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to formulate a diagnosis
- 7. Apply information about disease etiology and development to provide counseling to their patients regarding disease prevention and chiropractic wellness care.

Student understanding and mastery of the above stated learning outcomes will be evaluated using written exams and pop quizzes.

Major written exams (4) will be 90% multiple-choice using a standard scantron format with 10% short answer or fill in the blank. Each test in General Pathology is comprehensive and so material from previous sections of the course will be evaluated on every test.

Quizzes will be done in class in multiple choice, short answer or fill in the blank format. They will be used to reinforce student learning and introduce students to the types of questions that will be used in the lecture test. The quizzes may be open book or done in small groups to promote critical thinking and development of cooperative learning skills.

ESTIMATE OF STUDENT WORK LOAD:

A student should plan to spend a minimum of 5 - 10 hours per week on the materials presented in this course. Some may spend considerably more and some may spend less. Pathology is a subject that requires repetition to master and is the key for moving knowledge from short term memory to long term memory. The best way to study is to read over the material in the notebook and/or textbook the night before so that you are familiar with the material before you come into class. While in class you should pay attention by practicing **Present Time Consciousness** and taking notes in your notebook. After class you should read over your notes. If you do this consistently then you will have a head start on learning the material and will not to cram the night before the test (which does not work for Pathology). If you try to cram the night before the test the information will only be in short term memory and will be lost once the test is over. This is material that you really need to be able to be the best Doctor of Chiropractic that you can be for your future patients so start making sure that this makes it into long term memory.

90/90 RULE: This is a 90:90 course. To meet these requirements the student must have a 90.0% average in the course and no more than 5 hours of absence by the end of the last full week of lectures.
